

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
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MESSAGE FROM THE TOWN MANAGER

POLICE DEPARTMENT

Recently, the Police Department made a change to how its police cars are upfitted with all of the equipment that gets installed into the cab of our new cars, including radios, weapons mounts, and computer technology. Airwave Communications was selected as the vendor to upfit all our new patrol vehicles. We have received a lot of positive feedback from other law enforcement agencies about our upfit design, in fact, one of our new squad cars was showcased at the State Police Chief's Conference by Airwave Communications last week.


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WATER DEPARTMENT

During these times of water scarcity, the Payson Water Department proactively plans and manages its water resources portfolio. Historic data trends from multiple sources indicate that Payson is well positioned to deliver water to its customers even amidst this severe drought.

Water department staff routinely keep up to date with United States Geological Survey hydrologic data to develop an informed understanding of the C.C. Cragin surface water in storage as shown in the graph below. Based on the graph, water storage at the C.C. Cragin reservoir typically replenishes to above 80% of capacity, 50% of the time. This observation allows water staff to assume that about every other year the C.C. Cragin water allotment should be near 3000 acre-feet, which overall eases the department's ongoing effort to deliver a reliable water supply. Due to the startup of the water replenishment program in 2019, water levels in wells have rose 30 to 200 feet. This groundwater replenishment has enabled the water department to use the stored surface water during times when C.C. Cragin water allotment is small due to decreased C.C. Cragin storage years. In addition, the department is beginning to develop a methodology to forecast C.C. Cragin storage levels, based on snow depth levels measured in the C.C. Cragin watershed. The data are published by the Natural Resources Conservation Service every two weeks beginning in January and ending in April every year. These efforts help the Payson Water Department to make informed water

These efforts help the Payson Water Department to make informed water management decisions based on real-time water resources data during a time when water supply reductions are on-going in Arizona.

PAYSON AIRPORT

What do monsoon rains and warm temperatures mean to the Payson Airport? It is time to mow grass and weeds. One of the most important safety jobs at the airport is mowing of the areas adjacent to the runway and taxiway. Control of wildlife at the airport on the ground and in the air above is critical to the safe operation of the airport.

The airport is home to rabbits and ground squirrels. Eagles and hawks prey on the rabbits and squirrels. Both the small animals on the ground and the birds in the air can cause serious damage to an aircraft. John Adolph, Airport Operations, spends most of his time at the airport these days mowing. Studies have shown that the perfect height for grass at an airport is four inches. At this height the grass is tall enough to help fight erosion of the soils. Four inches is short enough not to give protective cover for small animals from the eagles and hawks above. So, if we can keep the grass at or below four inches, we have a natural way to control the wildlife population at the airport. With no rabbits or squirrels to eat, the eagles and hawks go elsewhere to find a meal. Now you know why John is always mowing during the monsoon season.
