Landon Marlowe has successfully completed the Field Training Officer (FTO) Program. This program is 16 weeks where a recruit/lateral officer is partnered with a fellow Payson Police Officer learning the policies of the department and town, and correctly applying concepts that were learned in the academy to be able to go solo. The officers are required to meet specific performance standards in four individual phases of specialized training before being certified for solo patrol duty.

EVIDENCE STORAGE

We are happy to announce that we received our new Air Science Ductless Evidence / Storage Cabinet. This cabinet is designed to store, dry, or otherwise process forensic evidence in the controlled environment of a tamper-resistant compartment to maintain the chain of custody.

NOTABLE CASES

On 09/27/2022 at approximately 3:01 a.m., an officer with the Payson Police Department conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle for no taillights. The vehicle pulled into a closed business parking lot and attempted to avoid the officer. During the subsequent investigation, the driver was determined to be under the influence of drug(s), more than 38 grams of methamphetamine and 47 fentanyl pills were in the driver's possession, and an addition 111 fentanyl pills were in the passenger's possession. The driver was arrested and booked into the Gila County Payson Jail on multiple felony charges to include possession of a dangerous drug for sale and aggravated driving under the influence. The passenger was also arrested and booked into the Gila County Payson Jail on multiple felony drug charges.

Did you know that all of the people who work for the Water Department have a specific education that enables them to safely deliver water to us? It's true, all of our water system operators have obtained and maintain Water Operator certifications with Arizona State to prove their proficiency.

The Town of Payson Water Department maintains required certifications for all employees and/or operators, who make decisions about process control or system integrity that affects public health in accordance with the Arizona Department of Environmental Quality (ADEQ) guidelines. These guidelines are in conformance with the United States Safe Drinking Water Act of 1974, Arizona Administrative Code Title 18, Chapter 4 Safe Drinking Water, Chapter 5, Article 1 – Rule for the Operator Certification Program and Chapter 9, Article 1 Rule for Water Pollution Control.

As part of that education and certification, 30 hours of Professional Development Hours (PDH's) are required every 3 years to maintain an operator's certifications. These PDH's can be obtained by attending training events. In an effort to reduce travel and lodging costs to maintain certifications, the Water Department coordinated with the Parks Department and the Arizona Water Association to host a Hands-On Operator Workshop at Ramada #5 in Rumsey Park. This event provided up to 6 PDH's for each operator and took place on September 22, 2022, from 8 am to 3 pm with great participation from many other water systems in the State. For example, Pine-Strawberry Water Improvement District, Chino Valley, Town of Gilbert, City of Phoenix, and Surprise all had attendees there. The event had multiple stations with training on items such as service connection fabrication, leak detection, water sampling techniques, fire hydrant repair, excavator equipment challenge and meter assembly and repair. The meter assembly and repair station included a timed competition for who could assemble a water meter in the shortest time. Our very own Brent Dirren won the competition with a time of 1 minute 22 seconds! Wow! That's fast!



TOWN OF PAYSON STREET OPERATIONS

The Street department is switching gears into autumn operations. Our focus this time of year is on crack sealing and preventative pothole repair, tree trimming and brushing projects. Residents should be aware that we will be trimming any nuisance trees and vegetation that make it difficult for our street sweeper to pass or for plow operations in winter. Right of Way clearance is 14 feet above roadway to the top back of curb and 7 feet over public sidewalks.



Earlier in the summer the Street Department welcomed a new CAT 415 backhoe which replaces an older model backhoe from the 1990s. Tim Ryden (foreground) was instrumental in acquisition of this machine during his time as interim manager of streets.

As Public Works evolves and the workforce becomes more dependent on technology, the Streets Department will continue to responsibly acquire new equipment and replace antiquated machinery.

Street Sweeping



Stormwater and flood control on many roadways can be challenging during the monsoon season. This image shows the rapid impact that the monsoons have as this section of Longhorn goes underwater for 20 minutes.



Year round the Town of Payson's streets see an influx of dust and debris, usually worsened by the monsoon season. Here the sweeper clears off a storm drain grate from accumulated pine needles.



Our operators work quickly to tackle these issues as they arise all the while balancing our daily maintenance routine as well as other requests for paving or pothole repair. Angie Lucchesi gives a wry smile as she maintains long sections of the Beeline and all the other 125 miles of roadway traveled by our Townsfolk.

Paving



Cities and Towns are required to contract for most major road projects. However, smaller paving projects consume a significant amount of time and focus during the late spring into the late fall annually. Nearly every paving project the Town performs inhouse is coordinated carefully with local asphalt production companies to determine availability of their product as well as proper composition. Above: The Ang gets loaded with several tons at Payson Concrete, while Clayton Randall monitors the vehicle's weight.

During loading or in between runs, the crew applies the asphalt to the affected areas needing repair or maintenance. Paving requires a large portion of our crew as most jobs require specialized equipment and skilled operators. The Street division is recruiting operators to fill three current vacancies. The department is small but mighty. Led by the Street Operations Manager, Andrew Jackson, when fully staffed the team includes nine field staff members and three mechanics.

Moving to Autumn operations


