Message from Fire Chief David Staub

Mayor, Council, Town Manager and Citizens of Payson,

I would like to thank each of you for your continued support of the Payson Fire Department. I present our Annual Report that documents many of our great accomplishments this last year. While our annual calls for service increased by 133 calls, this is the first year that the PFD has answered more than 4,000 calls for service. The average response time remained below 5 minutes at 4 minutes, 48 seconds, and we were on scene in Payson in 6 minutes or less 90% of the time.

We also spotlight other parts of the PFD this year as we expose you to more of our volunteers and our fuels management efforts.

2021 also saw the first time that the PFD engaged an outside firm, Public Safety Research Group, to examine our department. Specifically, they looked at station condition and location, staffing and future staffing needs, and provided guidance on future initiatives the department should engage in. This report will provide us guidance for the next five years.





Who we are and what we do





Members of the Payson Fire Department provide fire suppression for structure fires, wildland fires and vehicle fires. We perform vehicle extrication, rope rescues and swift water rescues. Respond to emergency medical issues, flooding issues, gas and fuel leaks (propane and gasoline), carbon monoxide issues, lock outs, lift assists, snake removals, bee swarms and more. We provide support for over 15 major community events throughout the year with incident management services, EMS, and education. Our members complete an average of over 400 hours of training each year.






Annual Response Trends for FY 2011/2012-FY 2021/2022





2021/22 Fuels Management

Suppression crews from Payson and Star Valley were provided required RT-130 wildfire refresher training. Training, physical fitness and fire experience were all input in to IQS wildland fire response qualifications system. Red cards were issued.

The 2020 Wild Fire Hazardous Fuels (WFHF) grant was funded for a project total cost of \$220,000. The grant is a 90/10 grant which will mitigate at least 88 acres of private property within the Town before the grant expires in March of 2023. As of October 2022, 53.7 acres have been mitigated.

Payson Fire Department was awarded the 2021 Healthy Forest Initiative grant for a total project cost of \$344,000. This grant project began work March of 2022 and will be completed by December 31, 2023. This 70/30 grant will address mitigation on 126 acres of properties within the Town. So far, we have mitigated 26 acres.

Payson Fire Department was notified we are going to be awarded a new 2022 Healthy Forest initiative grant for a \$593,000 project to mitigate another 179 acres of private and Town property.

\$1,157,000 worth of work within Payson by 2025 and about 400 acres of mitigated properties. Although the contractor changed, Payson and Rim Country were able to supply over 4 million pounds of biofuel to the Novo Power plant – in just one year.

The Payson Fire Department is very proud of our volunteers. They put in countless hours of hard work!
