

Department of Homeland Security Provides Additional Funding

The Payson Police Department is excited to announce that the Department of Homeland Security has allotted us an additional \$25,000 of grant funding to our department. Commander Hazelo had requested the additional funding during a recent Homeland Security meeting. These additional funds will help with the reconstruction of the Payson Police Department Emergency Operations Center (EOC). Due to the generosity of the Department of Homeland Security, we will be able to continue configuring our center with state-of-the-art equipment. Our EOC has already been utilized for local large-scale emergencies includes the Backbone Fire in 2021, snow related emergencies, and preparing and planning with our local, state, and federal partners.

Hyundai Provides Steering Wheel Locks for Local Residents

The vehicle manufacturer, Hyundai, became aware of a vulnerability in their vehicles with a steel key ignition, vehicle years 2011 through 2022. This issue had a large media push after a social media video was published showing how to steal those vehicles. In response, Hyundai provided law enforcement agencies across the country with steering wheel locks for both Hyundai vehicles and Kia vehicles made in that period, free of charge. The Payson Police Department reached out to Hyundai and was able to secure 120 steering wheel locks for our community. The wheel locks are available for pickup at the Payson Police Department during normal business hours. Since the wheel locks were received, we have already given away more than a dozen to residents of our community.

New Community Service Officer

In January, the Payson Police Department hired an additional full-time Community Service Officer. CSO Zach Bacskay recently moved to the Town of Payson, residing here with his family. CSO Bacskay has experience as a first responder, previously working in Maricopa County as an EMT. In addition, he is a trained CPR instructor and owns his own CPR company. CSO Bacskay is a welcome addition to the Payson Police Department, and we look forward to working with him.



The Street's Department as only had two real snow accumulations this season. December 1, of 2023 gave the Town its first dusting of snow, which melted by the following afternoon. We had just finished mounting all the decorative lighting for the Town the week prior.



Our crews' thoughtfully prepared all the horses and put them in the barn the night before each threat of a storm. Unfortunately, we only say the need for them that firs night in December.

A lot of people ask what we do in the winter and the answer usually comes as a surprise to most because we are usually busier with pruning, ditch clearing, and many other chores. But the main chore that the crew REALLY wants is the hoped for night in the snow keeping roads clean, clear, and drivable-able to the best of our abilities. We are able to stow up to 11 plow vehicles in our barn to have them dry and prepped before each storm.

Once a storm is over, unless the forecast calls for a dramatic shift in temperatures the next days to warmth, we will usually repark all the rigs in the barn the next night and come in several hours early to hit any slick spots on hills and intersections that are known for trouble.

Our next round of storms was about 6 weeks later in January. This one produced more snow than the last and was accompanied by several extended nights of freezing temperatures, but the roadways seemed to be safe and melted within a day or two and we still saw some accumulation hang around until our evening temps got above freezing.

WATER DEPARTMENT

As winter continues, the Payson Water Department emphasizes the importance of preparing your pipes for the cold weather to prevent freezing and potential damage.

One local resident just suffered a 16,000 gallon leak due to the recent cold weather conditions. Taking these preventive measures will help you avoid costly repairs and ensure a consistent water supply throughout the season.

To protect your pipes, consider the following recommendations:

Shut Off Your Outdoor Faucets: Turn off outdoor pipes at the shutoff valves and open the bleed cap at your faucet to drain any remaining water. If not needed, consider turning off faucets for the entire season.

Insulate Any Exposed Fixtures: Keep exposed faucets, spigots, and pipes warm by using faucet covers, foam pipe covers, or pipe wrap tape.

Monitor Temperature With Heat Tape: Wrap heating tape around exposed pipes, which you can find at hardware stores. This simple method helps keep your pipes warm when the temperature drops.

Keep A Steady Indoor Temperature: Maintain a thermostat setting of 60°F or above throughout the winter. While it may increase your heating bill, it will save you money by avoiding expensive plumbing repairs.

Update Your Weather Sealing: Check and replace weather sealing around windows and doors. Enhancing home insulation will not only keep you warm but also save on utility costs.

Keep Cabinets Warm: Leave cabinet doors open to allow warm air from the rest of your house to protect exposed pipes hiding inside.

Heat & Insulate Exposed Parts Of The Home: Make a plan to keep exposed pipes in un-insulated areas warm. Add insulation directly to the pipes and, if safe, use a small space heater.

Let Faucets Drip: During freezing temperatures, allow faucets to drip slowly. This maintains a safe water pressure and prevents water from freezing inside pipes.

Run Appliances Overnight: Utilize major appliances like the dishwasher, washing machine, and ice maker overnight to keep water moving through your pipes.

Use Frost-Free Sill Cocks: Install frost-free sill cocks for outdoor faucets. The working parts are stored inside your home, protecting them from the cold.

Disconnect Your Hoses: Remove hoses from faucets, drain pipes, and cover faucets for winter to prevent freezing and potential ice backup.

Track Your Home Temperature: Install smart Wi-Fi thermostats to monitor your house's temperature. Set notifications for dangerously low temperatures and adjust accordingly.

Seal Your Rim Joists: Use expandable foam and insulation to seal gaps between floor joists. Additionally, insulate and seal exterior holes where wires, pipes, or cables pass through.

Turn Off The Water When You Take A Trip: Before leaving town, turn off the water at the primary shutoff valve to prevent potential damage if pipes freeze or crack.

Insulate Your Garage: If water lines run through your garage, insulate the garage door and consider insulating the entire garage. Add heat cables to exposed pipes and set up a space heater ahead of serious winter storms.

Taking these steps will go a long way in preventing frozen pipes and ensuring a smooth winter season for everyone. If you have any questions or concerns, feel free to contact the Payson Water Department.
