🚨 Important announcement from Digital Payson 🚨

If you are interested in improving the internet service and infrastructure in the greater Payson area, this is your opportunity and our call-to-action for your assistance.

Under the federal BEAD (Broadband Equity Access and Deployment) program there is more than \$993 million of federal funding available for the State of Arizona to achieve universal high-speed internet access, especially to unserved and underserved areas.

This month-long process will enable stakeholders in Arizona to challenge the state's broadband map and the levels of internet service reported at homes and businesses throughout the state. Stakeholders will be able to challenge data provided by the map but must submit evidence of the inaccuracies.

It is CRITICAL to have accurate maps and data identifying locations requiring reliable broadband infrastructure and service.

The BEAD Challenge Process is the way in which the unserved, underserved, and served status of every home, business, and community anchor institution in the state will be determined. Unserved and underserved locations will be eligible to be connected through BEAD funded projects.

Per the new FCC (Federal Communications Commission) guidelines the following categories were determined:

·SERVED: Addresses with broadband service at least 100 Mbps download speed and 20 Mbps upload speed, with less than 100 ms of latency, and no data caps or limits.

·UNDERSERVED: Addresses with broadband service below 100 Mbps download and 20 Mbps upload speed but higher than 25 Mbps download and 3 Mbps upload speed. Latency is less than 100 ms, with no data caps or limits.

·UNSERVED: Addresses with broadband service below 25 Mbps download speed and 3 Mbps upload speed, or no internet service.

Acceptable internet service from providers is wired (coax, copper, or fiber), or fixed wireless (5G Home Internet, point-to-point microwave, LTE over CBRS), but DOES NOT include satellite internet service providers.


The BEAD Challenge Process is open now with the deadline to submit challenges of Tuesday, May 14th.

Pickle Ball Courts Reopened for now!

On Tuesday, May 7th we reopened the lower pickleball courts and tennis court at Rumsey Park. These courts were resurfaced to repair existing cracks on the playing surface, by a contractor, hired by the Town. During a post construction inspection, Town staff found that many of the preexisting cracks were already visible through the new surface. This condition is not in alignment with the Town's expectations related to the work performed under the agreement. The Town is working with the contractor to rectify the current unsatisfactory condition and remove the cracks from the playing surface. This will likely result in a future closer of the courts to have the work completed properly. We will keep the community informed as to the schedule, once we have additional information. The Parks and Recreation Department would like to apologize for any inconvenience cause as a result of these unforeseen and unfortunate circumstances.



Travis Kilbourne from Fire Apparatus Engineer to Fire Captain.



PLANNING AND ZONING DEPARTMENT

What is Zoning?

Zoning is the process of dividing land into different districts or zones to regulate land use and development. Each zone is designated for specific types of land use. In the Town of Payson, zoning districts are primarily categorized into:

- Residential
- Multi-family Residential
- Commercial
- Industrial zones

Why have zoning?

This helps to ensure orderly growth and development while also preserving the character and integrity of the community. Zoning ensures that land is used appropriately, preventing incompatible land uses from coexisting, and minimizing conflicts between residential, commercial, industrial, and other types of development. Besides delineating different land use categories and their allowable uses, zoning also plays a crucial role in establishing development standards such as setbacks, lot coverage, and building height. Commercial projects even have specific design standards to adhere to, like paint colors, building materials, and landscaping requirements.

Why is this Important?

The zoning code (known as the Unified Development Code) serves as a means to implement the Town's General Plan, ensuring thoughtful and coordinated development in line with community objectives and the overarching vision of the community.

Towns are required by state law to adopt a (ten-year) general plan. These plans help to guide a community's future development by setting long-term goals for land use, water resources, open space, parks and recreation, transportation, growth areas, cost of development, and environmental conservation. The General Plan is created with input from citizens, community stakeholders, staff, and planning professionals. It provides a framework for zoning decisions and infrastructure investments, reflecting the community's values and aiming for sustainable growth to ultimately enhance residents' quality of life.

PLANNING AND ZONING DEPARTMENT

The Town is currently in the process of updating its General Plan. Citizens can expect the final product to go to the Planning Commission and Council in June and on the ballot this November.

How does the Town make sure this code is followed?

Town staff have many ways of ensuring compliance with the code:

- Building and project permit reviews- Professional staff review projects to make sure all aspects of the code are met, and where a variance is needed, staff will facilitate whichever process is necessary to help achieve a successful end project.
- Business licensing and occupancy permits- ensures the right types of uses are operating within the guidelines of the code.
- Code Compliance- The town employs one Code Compliance Specialist. This
 person receives notifications of potential violations and conducts
 inspections for all properties within the Town of Payson. This position will
 verify if a violation exists per the zoning code and will seek compliance with
 the landowner/user.

Town Staff help ensure code compliance. The Town is excited to announce its newest team member, Tiffany Brown-Cocroft. She has joined the Town as the new Code Compliance Specialist. Over the past three years, she has been instrumental in enforcing code regulations, ensuring compliance, and fostering community growth. 

ARIZONA MUNICIPAL RISK RETENTION POOL

Arizona Municipal Risk Retention Pool: Managing Risk, Maximizing Returns The Arizona Municipal Risk Retention Pool (AMRRP) has long been a cornerstone in the prudent management of risk-related expenses for our town. As a member of AMRRP, we have benefited from a collective approach to risk management, leveraging the pool's resources and expertise to mitigate potential liabilities effectively.

One of the key advantages of our AMRRP membership is the cost-effectiveness it offers. By sharing resources and spreading risk across multiple municipalities, AMRRP is able to provide coverage at competitive rates, often at lower costs than individual insurance policies. This collective approach not only saves taxpayer dollars but also ensures that our town has access to high-quality insurance coverage without breaking the budget.

In a testament to effective risk management practices and collaborative efforts, the Arizona Municipal Risk Retention Pool (AMRRP) has announced the issuance of a \$13 million dividend to its property/casualty Members. This decision follows another exceptional three-year period where losses and fulfillment of projected surplus have outperformed expectations. The formula for calculating the dividend is simple and based on prior three years of premium and loss history, the Town of Payson dividend calculation results in a refunded premium amount of \$292,684 for 2024.

The dividend distribution underscores the value of membership in AMRRP and the tangible benefits it offers to participating municipalities. Not only does it provide financial relief to member communities, but it also reinforces the importance of proactive risk management strategies in safeguarding public assets and resources.

For the Town of Payson, this dividend represents a significant opportunity to offset future risk-related expenses and maintain financial stability. It is a testament to the dedication and commitment of our local council members and staff to prioritize safety and risk mitigation in our community. As stewards of taxpayer dollars, we remain committed to leveraging every opportunity to maximize returns and ensure the long-term prosperity of our community.
