

MESSAGE FROM THE TOWN MANAGER

PROGRESS REPORT FOR ROADWAY PROJECTS Granite Dells: Beeline Bus Projects: Pavement Preservation

GRANITE DELLS ROAD

Project Overview:

Improvements include reconstruction of the existing roadway with minor widening and an improved profile, storm drain upgrades and expansion, waterline extensions and replacement, and modification of the Safeway Center driveway onto Granite Dells to a right-in-right-out only configuration to improve safety and congestion.

Work Progress:

Our contractor, Apache Underground and Excavating, continues to work on installing storm drains, waterlines, valves, and fire hydrants. They are also continuing communication efforts to keep affected businesses informed about the project as well as working to regularly update the electronic messaging boards notifying residents of closures and detours as needed. Estimated completion is December 2024.

BEELINE BUS ROUTE IMPROVEMENTS

Project Overview:

The project consists of two phases. Phase I includes improvements with the use of federal funding and consists of sidewalks, ramps, bus stop pads and shelters, and pavement reconstruction on 5 different streets (Colcord Road, McClane Road, Easy Street, Summit Street, and Ponderosa Street). Phase 2 includes additional roadway improvements outside the federal fund eligibility limits on those same roads.

Work Progress:

The Final bid package has been submitted to ADOT for approval to advertise, and the final plans are being reviewed by the Design Firm,

Entellus, for quality assurance and constructability purposes. The Project will advertise as soon as ADOT approves and Entellus completes plan updates. CEI, our Project Management Firm, is reaching out to contractors to encourage bid consideration. Estimated completion time to be determined once work is awarded.

PAVEMENT PRESERVATION

Project Overview:

The project consists of two phases of improvements. Phase 1, completed in November 2023, included crack sealing and slurry sealing at multiple locations on a dozen different roadways for a cost of \$900,765. Phase 2 includes reconstruction of a variety of roadway segments, potentially including segments of Airport Road, Manzanita Drive, Bonita Street, Ponderosa Street, and others pending project costs and available budget.

Work Progress:

Cost estimates for a variety of roadway segments per the FY23 master list is being developed by DBA. Project preparation documents have been completed such as the geotechnical report with pavement section recommendations, and the ADA assessment report. The Town will begin reviewing price proposals and determine which segments to include in the project within the next two weeks. Once segments are known, DBA will prepare final Job Order proposal with cost and schedule.



Per- and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances (PFAS) UPDATE

On April 10, 2024, EPA announced the final National Primary Drinking Water Regulation (NPDWR) for six PFAS.

Chemical	Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG)	Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL)
PFOA	0	4.0 ppt
PFOS	0	4.0 ppt

^{*}Compliance is determined by running annual averages at the sampling point

The final rule requires:*

- Public water systems must monitor for these PFAS and have three years to complete initial monitoring (by 2027), followed by ongoing compliance monitoring. Water systems must also provide the public with information on the levels of these PFAS in their drinking water beginning in 2027.
- Public water systems have five years (by 2029) to implement solutions that reduce these PFAS if monitoring shows that drinking water levels exceed these MCLs.
- Beginning in five years (2029), public water systems that have PFAS in drinking water which violates one or more of these MCLs must take action to reduce levels of these PFAS in their drinking water and must provide notification to the public of the violation.

Town staff meet virtually with the ADEQ representatives and a state approved engineering firm on May 02, 2024 for a PFAS kick-off study. Outcome from the meeting is that the Town will start the initial compliance monitoring for the regulated PFAS this coming June. The initial compliance monitoring will occur quarterly over a period of one year. After the first

sampling results are in, another meeting will be held to discuss potential treatment options for affected wells.

ADEQ's support for determination and mitigation has been made available with \$42 million in federal Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) funding and an additional \$5 million in state funding.

The Water Department has also completed UCMR5 PFAS testing and results can be found in the 2023 Consumer Confidence Report (CCR).

PFAS Pilot Study

The Water Dept. has proactively been taking steps to address PFAS constituents found in some of the Town's drinking water wells. In coordination with the ADEQ and the EPA, the Department set up a pilot system with four (4), four inch (4") diameter columns holding different types of media to test for effectiveness of PFAS removal.





Why is the EPA involved when the ADEQ is the delegated authority for regualtory enforcement? EPA's Office of Research and Development (ORD) has a Technical Assistance Project for Treating Emerging Contaminants with intial focus on PFAS.



On May 01, 2024 Town personnel meet with the EPA and the ADEQ representatives to start up the pilot system at one of the major producing wells in the Town. The plan is to run the pilot for at least six months or longer if needed. EPA's scope is to help communities determine the most cost-effective approaches for removing emerging contaminants (EC) from drinking water. Partnering with EPA on this project benefits the Town by EPA paying for bottles, shipping, and biweekly sampling analytical costs. Payson is one of the first of ~50 systems in the nation that are participating in this program.
